Kwaï fellow band members,

Another year has come and gone. My wish for the coming year is that the wisdom of our experiences helps us grow and continue on our journey toward health and happiness.

As our community continues to expand with many new public service developments in the works, we continue to work hard in the interest of a better future. Our advancement as a nation is happening at a steady and manageable pace. Praise to our administrative teams, both Band Council and Wabanaki services who carefully orchestrate and follow our progress in the many community development initiatives.

These upcoming few years are crucial in the continued advancement of our Nation. We are at a pivotal moment in our grandchildren's history where we have been given the responsibility to manage restorative resources in such a way that we continue to cut the strings of dependency on values and constraints that do not reflect our worldviews.

Continuing to walk in our ancestors' footsteps and think for the next 7 generations is our responsibility. We are currently working hard on finalizing our land claims. 
Contrary to the outdated perception of those who govern the state, we are not a people who need to be directed, conquered or civilized to another way of life, we need to continue to assert and affirm our journey home. The boundary is clear to us that our provinces fight for sovereignty is no different than our own, although we often have conflicting agendas. We will continue our work as clearly reflected in the teachings of the two-row wampum standing firm on the agreements made in the Treaty of Niagara which safeguards us as we assert sovereign rights and reclaim pour power to self-determination.

Restoring our language and governing practices will continue to solidify ad anchor our existence. Planning a healthy stable future is the continuity of our story as Abenaki peoples. We are blessed to have the fortitude to continue this fight. We must keep our focus; our great grandchildren are depending on us.










TWO AWARDS FOR NICOLE O'BOMSAWIN

WORD FROM MANAGEMENT

Kwaï mziwi!

The construction of the shelter for Indigenous women and children fleeing violence was completed on December 13. At the time of writing, we were in the process of hiring the shelter's director. Once in office, the director will need to establish the structure required to ensure the proper functioning of the shelter. This includes drafting job descriptions for the positions to be filled and developing administrative procedures and policies. Additionally, the director will need to purchase all the furniture and various equipment for the rooms, common areas, and administrative offices. Lastly, she will collaborate on setting up the shelter's board of directors. As you can see, there are still several tasks to complete before we can consider opening the shelter. The director will have a lot on her plate but rest assured that she won't be handling everything alone. We will provide support with the help of various internal resources and, if necessary, seek external resources to assist her.

We are currently issuing a call for tenders on SEAO (the electronic tendering system) to hire an architectural and engineering consulting firm for the construction of the new childcare center. These professionals will be tasked with preparing the final plans for the architecture as well as building systems (foundations, structures, electricity, ventilation, heating, etc.). We believe construction of the new childcare center should begin next June, with an investment of just over \$4 million.

To stabilize staffing levels within Indigenous police forces in Quebec, we are in discussions with Quebec's Ministry of Public Security and Canada's Ministry of Public Safety to increase staffing levels with significant additional funding. Both ministries aim to ensure that Indigenous police forces achieve parity with the Sûreté du Québec in terms of overall compensation for officers.

We have received an offer from the Ministries of Public Security in Quebec and Canada to increase staffing for the Abenaki Police Force. The offer would raise the number of funded officers from 7 to 14 for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. Additionally, two more officers would be added, bringing the total to 16 for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. We are currently analyzing the ministries' proposal and have submitted a counteroffer. At the time of writing, we were awaiting a response to our counteroffer. Among the issues is the actuarial deficit in the police pension fund

for Indigenous police forces in Quebec, which is partly due to this increase in officer compensation. We will keep you updated on this matter.

As for the specific claims regarding the "Régime seigneurial et les 38 lots", we are still waiting for the final text of the settlement agreement. Once this step is completed, we will hold information sessions to present the offer to you, our members, for ratification.

Subsequently, we will hold additional information sessions for members to explain how the compensation from our claims will be used and the best way to manage the funds. This includes discussing a trust, how it could be structured, and so forth. Stay tuned.

A special general assembly for the adoption of proposed amendments to the Citizenship Code will be held in February or March—though the exact date has not yet been set. Due to the current political uncertainty within the federal government, we must focus all our efforts on the specific claims files, as we are in the final stretch. If federal elections are called before we have ratified the settlement agreement and the Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada has signed it, the file could be delayed for several more months. Stay tuned.

NEWS FROM TOURISME ODANAK

Odanak, November 20, 2024 - Exciting news for the Odanak community: the creation of Tourisme Odanak. Tourisme **Odanak's** mission is to promote the destination by showcasing the cultural and natural heritage of the community. Its main functions include **promoting** tourism, developing essential visitor infrastructure, and managing tourist reception and information. The Odanak tourism committee is actively working on the development of "Tourisme Odanak," an initiative aimed at highlighting the cultural and historical richness of the community. This project is already underway, with the establishment of a clear vision, mission, and values, as well as the creation of a logo and brand identity. The organization works closely with local, regional, and governmental stakeholders. It supports cultural events and festivals, such as the Pow Wow, and plays a key role in **research** and data collection to enhance the tourism offering, while raising awareness among the public and visitors about cultural and environmental preservation in the region.

LA TOURNÉE DE LA SAINT-FRANÇOIS: A KEY TOURIST CIRCUIT

As part of this initiative, the community is actively involved in developing a tourist circuit called La Tournée de la Saint-François. This circuit will highlight the historical and cultural elements unique to Odanak and its surroundings, offering visitors a unique opportunity to explore significant locations and stories of the Nation. A working committee has been formed to create meaningful territorial markers along Alsig8ntegw, which holds a central place in the community's history and culture.

THE ÉCONOMUSÉE NETWORK SOCIETY

In its efforts to enhance heritage value, Odanak benefits from the support of the ÉCONOMUSÉE Network Society, an organization specializing in showcasing artisanal expertise. Their expertise in developing living museums and interpretation spaces will be crucial in designing authentic and enriching tourist experiences. Their support will spotlight the craftsmanship and traditions of the Odanak community while making these skills more accessible to visitors. Thanks to their assistance, two landmark projects are currently in development:

1. A Heritage Space and a Culinary Space

Among the flagship projects of "Tourisme Odanak" are two dedicated spaces to celebrate heritage. The first, Heritage Space, will focus on ancestral practices such as ash pounding and basket weaving, ensuring the preservation and transmission of these traditional skills to future generations while offering visitors insights into these crafts. The second, Culinary Space, will immerse visitors in the traditional recipes and culinary practices of the Nation, promoting the discovery of local flavors and regional products.

2. The Pow Wow: A Unifying Event

The project also emphasizes cultural events, with a special focus on the annual Pow Wow. A dedicated intern has been hired to assist in organizing this iconic event. The Pow Wow is a must-attend gathering where the culture and traditions of the First Nations are celebrated through dance, music, and songs. The intern will collaborate with organizers to enrich and enhance the event.

A COMMUNITY UNITED AROUND THE PROJECT

"Tourisme Odanak" is more than just a tourism project. It represents a collective effort, where every community member is encouraged to contribute. The tourism committee and various working groups are striving to build a sustainable project that benefits both the local population and visitors.

Through this initiative, Odanak aims not only to attract tourists but also to strengthen the sense of belonging and preserve the living traditions of the Nation. By developing these cultural and tourist spaces, Odanak positions itself as a **must-visit destination** for those seeking to explore the heritage of the Odanak community in an authentic and respectful setting.

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
In the form of various cultural expressions, the show will start at 7pm on the theater stage and plunge you into the W8banaki universe, with a rich program of artistic and cultural expression.

The trip combined exploration, learning and reconnection with nature, offering the youngsters a truly sensory experience.

ARCHAEOLOGY

Archaeologists are hard at work protecting the Nation's heritage on the Ndakina. Here are some of the projects they have recently completed:

- Archaeological inventory in Sainte-Victoire-de-Sorel, Odanak, on the west bank of the Gentilly River, etc.;
- Archaeological excavation of the Wajosis site in Bécancour;
- Monitoring of eroding archaeological zones on Alsig8ntegw (Saint-François River) and W8linaktegw (Bécancour River);
- Visit of the Brompton petroglyph site with members and guardians of the territory.

The team is strengthening its collaboration with archaeologists in New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont to ensure the W8banaki Nation's interests and presence are well represented on the American side of the Ndakina.

The **Abenaki Fishing Log** application is available on the App Store or Google Play using your Nation fishing license number. It lets you record your catches, their weight and length.

This information is very important to us. It helps us protect sites, species and our ancestral rights. Data is confidential, anonymous and secure.

THE WLIPOGWAT (DELICIOUS) BANQUET!

Wlipogwat means "it's good" or "it tastes good" in Aln8ba8dwaw8gan. It aims to enhance the value of w8banaki food found on the Ndakina and make these resources and knowledge more accessible.

The process of renewing the OHC's accreditation status is progressing in line with the continuous quality and safety improvement plan (CQSIP/2024-2025) presented to and adopted by the various bodies concerned.

Every week, children aged two to five have the chance to visit the FNHSP premises to discover and learn more about Abenaki culture. Indigenous music accompanies the youngsters throughout the activities, and they can discover flora, fauna, vocabulary, songs, dances and traditions. What could be better than an afternoon nap with Ms. Claire? During the winter, she'll be taking a well-deserved vacation, and service will resume as usual on her return.

With regard to food security, game distribution is now handled by the BETO in collaboration with the OHC nutritionist. If you are experiencing food insecurity, don't hesitate to contact Marie-France David. Meals on Wheels serves close to 50 portions every Wednesday and Friday. We first opened our doors to community elders. Since not all places were filled, we also accepted applications from individuals on income security. Finally, to support parents on parental leave, we opened our doors to moms and dads who are at home with baby during the child's first year of life. We welcomed two new delivery drivers, Ms. Eugénie Nolett-Descheaux and Mr. Marcel Durand. They started delivering at the end of November. Many thanks to Mme Andrée Provost, her husband Jean-Pierre, and Mme Jessica Ann Watso for all their hard work!

The Kchaiak committee wishes to offer a variety of activities for people aged 50 and over living in the community. The aim is to break the isolation of the elderly. We would also like to remind you that knitting afternoons are held on Tuesdays from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. in the Aln8baïwi Hall. Some additions have been made to enhance the offer. Puzzles, mandalas, fabric painting, diamond painting and books of crosswords, word puzzles and Sudoku are also available on site. Every month, the entire population is invited to a community lunch. Recently, we had a visit from the dental hygienist and adapted physical exercise workshops will resume in January with Christina. Be on the lookout for these activities! They are varied, inclusive and unifying!



DO YOU KNOW YOUR RIGHTS?

PATIENTS' RIGHT TO CONFIDENTIALITY

Everyone has the right to privacy. This fundamental right is guaranteed by the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and the Civil Code of Québec.

Healthcare establishments are subject to several laws in order to respect this fundamental right. In particular, section 19 of the Act respecting health services and social services provides a framework for this right.

"A user's record is confidential and no one may have access to it, except with the consent of the user or of the person authorized to give consent on the user's behalf, on the order of a court or a coroner in the exercise of his or her functions or where this Act provides that an institution may be required to communicate information contained in the record."

ACCESS TO HEALTH INFORMATION

YOUR HEALTH INFORMATION CAN BE FOUND :

- In the physical medical file kept in the medical archives department.
- As a computerized or digitized file, controlled by access codes (ID and password for traceability of actions).

The medical record is an essential multidisciplinary tool for ensuring continuity of care. Healthcare professionals have access to it only in the context of their duties and where the information is relevant to the provision of care. Confidentiality agreements are signed to this effect, and sanctions may be applied in the event of breach.

ANY PATIENT MAY CONTACT THE HEALTHCARE ESTABLISHMENT TO :

- Consult his/her file.
- Obtain photocopies of his/her file.
- Make a rectification request.
- Obtain assistance with an access request.
- Exercise his/her right of refusal.
- Exercise his/her right of recourse.

Among your New Year's resolutions, you might want to get back into shape, do more physical activity or eat healthier.



NON-INSURED HEALTH BENEFITS (NIHB)

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NIHB PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

Eligible clients must reside in Quebec, whether they live inside or outside the Odanak community:

- a registered member of the Odanak Band.
- a child under 2 years old whose parent is NIHB eligible.

HOW TO ACCESS NIHB PRODUCTS AND SERVICES

- Before making a purchase or receiving a service, contact the Odanak Health Centre in your community to confirm program eligibility and benefit coverage, and to find an enrolled service provider.
- You may need to provide a prescription or medical justification.

HOW TO OBTAIN REIMBURSEMENT

If you have already paid for an eligible product or service, follow these steps to obtain a reimbursement:

- Contact the NIHB Program Liaison Officer at the Odanak Health Centre.
- Reimbursement requests for all other benefits are processed by Express Scripts Canada and can be submitted by mail, fax, or online through a secure web account. Visit nihb-ssna.express-scripts.ca for more information or to create an NIHB client web account nihb-ssna.express-scripts.ca.

PAY PROGRAM PROCESSES

- 1. If you are covered by another health plan, such as an employer-funded program, you must submit claims there first.
- **2.** The NIHB Program will pay the difference up to the maximum amount of the rate chart.

MEDICAL TRANSPORTATION

We've noticed an increase in lastminute cancellations when the customer doesn't have the driver they want. When you are assigned the contract driver, a CAB volunteer driver or a cab, this means that there is no availability with the permanent driver.

Please note that if you refuse to travel with the designated driver, your transportation request will be refused. In addition, no fuel refund will be authorized.

A complaint form is available at the Health Center reception desk if you have a complaint about the medical transportation service.

For insurance reasons, all users of medical transportation must sit in the back.

CANCELLED APPOINTMENT

If your appointment is cancelled, please notify the OHC as soon as possible (at least 24 hours in advance) to avoid having the reserved transport come to your home and having to pay travel expenses.

In the event that a customer misses an MT previously authorized by the coordinator, or even forgets to call to cancel an authorized medical transport, sanctions will be applied.




